
Cooperstown will be doing the very same thing five years from now.





Ryan poised to go down in history as one of city's great sports figures

As someone that has watched sports in this town for 40-something years, I have seen some great players come through Atlanta. When I was 10, my grandparents took me to see Hank Aaron break the alltime home run record. I watched Dominique

Wilkins on many nights at The Omni, covered first-hand the incredible performances of pitchers such as Greg Maddux, Tom Glavine and John Smoltz, and witnessed Chipper Jones get his first major league at-bat.

But last Saturday up at Flowery Branch, as the Falcons moved through their second day of summer practice, I couldn't help but notice a certain player, one I believe will some day be remembered as one of the best athletes ever to play here.

Wearing No. 2 on his back and standing 6-foot-4, Matt Ryan appeared as a figure ready to take over this town, much like his did. But while Vick thrilled us all with his incredible athletic ability, I think Ryan finally gives the Falcons a player capable of leading us to Super Bowl victory, something that has escaped the franchise in its 39-year history.

It's not that Ryan is so athletwas born to play quarterback,

which I think is the toughest position in professional sports, and does so like a great conductor leads his symphony. Watching Ryan in the most mundane of drills, he is the master of perfection, understanding he is there to lead, to put things in motion and to let players like Michael Turner and new tight end Tony Gonzalez do the real damage.

He understands that being a good NFL quarterback is much different than being a good college quarterback. Think about it: How many highly productive college quarterbacks never make it in the NFL? In fact, name me 15 quarterbacks you would want on your fantasy team and, for that matter, look

around the league and consider the players who are holding down the No. 2 quarterback spot on most rosters.

Ryan, maybe even more so than Brady, is a student of the game, a coach on the field whose success will come more from

his work in the film room than from throwing out routes on the practice field to Roddy White.
Gonzalez told reporters about Ryan,

"He knows exactly where everybody's going. He knows where to put that ball, and he works hard. I think that's really the difference in what a great player is: somebody that works hard. That's what separates some guys, like Peyton Manning and Tom Brady. Those guys are constantly in the (film) room, trying to get better, on the field and off the field.

Interestingly, Ryan makes me feel the same way Chipper Jones did when I first saw him in West Palm Beach back in 1991. Covering the Braves for the AJC, Chipper was in the batting cage when I first laid eyes on him and despite being just 19 at the time, I felt something special watching him swing and drive a ball into the outfield. Jones was more of a physical talent, but I knew I was watching a future Hall of Famer.

There are those that wonder if Ryan had a fluke year and, now that he has played for a full season,

ners who went on the following season to improve their numbers. That list includes Randy Moss (1998 with Minnesota), Edgerrin James (1999 with Indianapolis), Clinton Portis (2002 with Denver), Anguan Boldin (2003 with Arizona), Ben Roethlisberger (2004 with Pittsburgh) and Adrian Peterson (2007 with Minnesota).

Anyway, as I watched Ryan last week-

end, I also noticed he now has full control of the team and is a player the others are listening to, a leader who has command of his offense and the ability to push it to greater heights.

A year ago, we all wondered what No. 2 could do and the expectation for the entire team was just a couple of wins. Behind Ryan and others, the team won 11 games and went to the playoffs.

Despite a difficult schedule, there is no reason to think the Falcons can't match, or even better, last season's performance. But regardless of the final result, we are all watching something very exciting in No. 2.

White inks lucrative new deal; preseason schedule opens at Detroit this Saturday

Tt's been an exciting two weeks for the boys In Flowery Branch at training camp. It concluded with the fans attending Brookwood High School last Friday for a scrimmage, and on Saturday, the Georgia Dome was rocking as the Falcons hosted a mock game for all in attendance. But the question on everyone's mind was, when is Roddy White coming back to the team?

That question was answered on Saturday, as White agreed to a six-year, \$50 million contract extension with \$18 million guaranteed. But prior to the White deal, the Falcons also inked two veteran receivers in Marty Booker and Robert Ferguson to help bolster the position after Harry Douglas went down with an injury.

HEADING TO MOTOWN ...

In the first preseason game of the year this Saturday, the Falcons will travel to Detroit to take on the Lions. Usually in the first preseason game starters such as Matt Ryan and

Michael Turner only see a series and sit for the rest of the game. This will be an opportunity for the young players to show the coaching staff what they've got. Rookie cornerback Chris Owens is having a strong camp and will be a player to watch. Also, fans should keep an eye on defensive tackle Peria Jerry, as he will work with the first-team and second-team defense. But Falcons fans will want to pay close attention to tight end Tony Gonzalez to see how he works with Ryan. The two have been great at camp, but will it translate to ingame success? The action will take place on Saturday on NBC at 4 p.m.

WHAT'S ON TAP ...

After preseason game No. 1, the Falcons will have another week of training camp practice before they go on the road again to face the St. Louis Rams. Again, it will be a game where the starters will see little playing time and the rookies will have another opportunity to impress the coaches. The Falcons will have their first home preseason game on Saturday, Aug. 29, when they face the San Diego Chargers; that will be a nationally televised game on CBS at 8 p.m. On Sept. 1., the team will have to cut the roster down to 75 players, and on Sept. 3, the Falcons will have their final home preseason game when they face the Baltimore Ravens on NBC at 7:30 p.m. Two days later, the Falcons will make final roster cuts and will get the regular season underway on Sept. Georgia Dome at 1 p.m.

Though the offense was a little slow to start, that can be expected with the first live action of the fall. But the preseason starts this Saturday, giving the players a chance to play against players who don't wear the Red and Black for a change.

The Detroit Lions, Atlanta's Saturday opponent, was dead last in the league in total defense, allowing over 32 points a game and over 404 total yards. So, it may not be the best indicator of how far the first-team offense has come, but it should give the players a much-needed run-through. San Diego and Baltimore in the last two preseason weeks should provide a much harder challenge.

suit of the former Cavalier for the last month. He will command between \$2-4 million a year, remains an efficient low-post threat and is a more-than-capable outside shooter. While he is no doubt a quality pickup for any contender, at 34, his decline can't be too far down the road.

Stromile Swift: Swift has been a pretty big disappointment since being drafted second overall more than nine years ago, but even as an undersized center he blocks shots and rebounds the basketball. He has, however, been known to lack focus and discipline, instead relying on his God-given abilities to get by.

Life after football sweet for Bulldog great

It was Sept. 17, 2006, and it was supposed to be just another day at the office for David Pollack. Play defense, rush the quarterback, and hit anything moving. But on that Sunday three years ago, Pollack's life changed forever. The Cincinnati Bengal and former UGA All-American moved in for what was supposed to be a routine tackle, but wound up being carried off the field on a stretcher.

A broken vertebrae, a halo brace for three months and the uncertainty about always being one hit away from possibly being confined to a wheelchair for the rest of his life are the reasons why one of the most decorated defensive college football players in the game's history walked away from it all. Most athletes would have had a hard time leaving the game they love, but to this 27-year old husband and father it was a blessing in disguise.

"Breaking my neck was the best thing that could have ever happened to me because I was always one of those ADD guys playing all over the place and getting into everything," Pollack says. "If I had extra time, I was always running, working out, or training. I remember reading a passage of scripture when I was in my halo and it was 'Be still and know that I am God.' I had never done that, just sat back and relaxed."

After the injury occurred, Pollack planned on using a history degree to become a high school teacher so he could _

coach football. However, the former first-round draft pick decided to step behind a microphone instead of a desk. Originally starting at CSTV, Pollack now has a home at Atlanta's own AM 790 The Zone.

"I got my first gig with

CSTV doing an SEC pregame show," Pollack says. "I started to really like it and I wanted to find something that kept me close to the game. My agent ended up contacting 790, and I really enjoyed it there so I just decided to sign on with them.

"Basically I'm a sports junkie, I love talking sports and I'm very opinionated and that is why I wanted to do this."

The transformation from being a highprofile athlete into a "media guy" was something that Pollack had to get used to over time.

"It was a tough transition because I got annoyed with the media sometimes (while I was playing) and didn't necessarily like it all the time," he explains. "So I just kind of figured out what I did and didn't like when I was a player."

With some experience under his belt and a fan base in the metro area, Pollack is looking to broaden his horizons in the near future. "I'm doing ESPN this year and I'll be working with them doing SEC programming. Probably a pre-game and post-game show, stuff like that."

The passion that Pollack displays on his show can be linked to the competitive fire that still burns within him. In fact, the former superstar claims he hasn't lost a step. "Oh I still got it," he says. "It's just too many screws, rods and plates in the neck."

However, if asked how much he misses the game on a scale of 1-10, his answer might surprise you. "Depends on the day. Some days zero, and some days 10. When you go out there and it is 100 degrees outside when you're playing golf, you don't have the desire to put the pads on and beat the crap out of somebody. But it all depends on the moment."

Even though he never got to deliver on the promise of his great college career, Pollack says he likes his story just the way it's turned out. "I wouldn't mess with anything. I have been so blessed in my life and career. I was a first-round draft pick. Everything has made me so much better. I wouldn't change a single thing, I'm very blessed to be where I am and I'm just very happy."

It doesn't get much better than that.
