The Wheeler boys entered the contest ranked No. 2 in the state, while the Raiders had just fallen out of the rankings. I had the play-byplay call along with Score Atlanta's own Bob Houghton providing color commentary. This is our second year as a team doing basketball, and thus far the tandem has been clicking full-steam ahead. XL CHANGES DATE, TIME

Speaking of GPB on Tuesdays, GPB Sports Central XL has packed up the moving vans and moved from Wednesdav nights 8-9 p.m. to its new slot, Tuesdays from 2-3 p.m. The decision was made to change time slots because more people would watch during the day opposed to at night during primetime television time. Sports Central XL also will preview that night's basketball game, creating a sports synergy that will last all day Tuesday. Sports Central XL will also air a special recruiting show this Wednesday, February 2 for National Signing Day, featuring Score Atlanta's The Official Visit co-hosts Fletcher Proctor and Scott Janovitz as well as Sports Central XL regulars Alex Ewalt and Mark Harmon.

BLUE CHIP EXPERTS ...

Recruiting is getting bigger and bigger in the local media scene. In addition to Score Atlanta's The Official Visit (Monday 7-9 p.m.) on Sports Radio 790 The Zone, the station is also talking more recruiting on Pollack & Bell. Surely much to the chagrin of Mike Bell, ESPN experts such as Tom Luginbill have made appearances recently. I have appeared on the Ford Football Show the last few Sundays to discuss recent recruiting movement, and the station may decide to once again give recruiting updates throughout the day as it did last year with Scott Janovitz.

680 The Fan, not to be outdone, has had the AJC's Chip Towers seemingly on every show every few days, and according to his blog online, Towers has been appearing on radio shows throughout the state. Even local papers such as the Gwinnett Daily Post and the Marietta Daily Journal are starting to run recruiting stories on a semi-regular basis, trying to get a scoop on some of the recruiting services such as Rivals and Scout.

ON THE SPIRIT ...

The AJC's Jeff Schultz presented a wellwritten column/blog last week about the Atlanta Spirit Group and their apparent lies over the potential sale of the Atlanta Thrashers. While Schultz did a very nice job of laying out several points from a recent suit brought up by the Thrashers' owners against its former attorneys, I must apologize to Schultz for not caring. He brought up some interesting revelations and evidence that the ASG was trying to sell the franchise, but I just don't give a rip. And before you say, "Oh you just don't like hockey," let me respond by saying, "that's bull-hockey." I DO like the NHL. Going to hockey games is 10 pounds of fun in a five-pound funbag. But the Thrashers have failed for so long that I have stopped caring about them.

MAKING CUTS ...

Last week on Score Atlanta Sports Sunday, when talking about the recent trend of college teams oversigning recruits, former Furman wide receiver Josh Cole made a plea that mirrored a recent plea in the AJC by Schultz to end the practice of "oversigning" on National Signing Day. In a typical year, a team can give out no more than 25 scholarships to a signing class, but you also (in an ideal world) would only give out 25 as a true max and would dole out just as many open spots as you have available to meet the 85 scholarship player max. Cole revealed that the scholarships are in fact a one-year agreement, but it is assumed that schools will renew the scholarship every year for four or five years.

That is not the case anymore it seems. Schools in the SEC in particular are oversigning and forcing the older players to sit out due to "medical hardship" or transfer to let the younger, better players play. Others are being asked to grayshirt, ie, sit out a year to count towards next year's class. The oversigning is basically hoarding and if it is costing a player his education because the new freshman can run .1 second faster. That is a shame. But then, I guess the whole "student-athlete" term is being washed away to just "athlete" a little more every day.

UGA INSIGHT ...

Finally, if you missed last Sunday's Score Atlanta Sports Sunday on The Zone, our managing editor Stephen Black called in to discuss the Georgia Bulldogs and his insight rivaled any insight provided by either the AJC's Georgia beat writer or the Athens All I'm saying is that he can finish the game on a hurt knee ... SIGNING DAY SPECIAL RICKY DIMON Local high school football stars to make final college decisions Wednesday

The biggest day in college football's offseason is just around the corner. National Signing Day will take center stage Wednesday when high school seniors can sign binding National Letters of Intent.

As always, plenty of the top prospects in the state of Georgia have already made verbal commitments to their schools of choice. However, the drama will not be limited to the recruits who are still uncommitted. Case in point: former Calhoun star Da'Rick Rodgers had given his word to the Georgia Bulldogs, but on National Signing Day in 2010 he gave Mark Richt the cold shoulder and signed with SEC rival Tennessee.

STILL UNDECIDED ...

Two of the state's most highly-touted 2011 recruits have not yet decided as National Signing Day rapidly approaches. Carver-Columbus running back Isaiah Crowell and Thomas County Central defensive end Ray Drew are still weighing their offers—or if they have come to decisions, they are not tipping their hands.

Crowell has narrowed his choices to Auburn, Alabama and Georgia. The Bulldogs appear to be using the same tactics to lure Crowell as Tennessee employed to snag Rogers last year. Rogers flip-flopped to the Vols after they got a commitment from Calhoun quarterback and good friend Nash Nance. Perhaps Richt took notes, because he recently offered a scholarship to Carver-Columbus defensive back Quintavious Harrow, Crowell's best friend since kindergarten.

"People are going to have their opinions about why Georgia offered Quintavious," Carver-Columbus head coach Dell McGee told the AJC. "All I know is that he is getting a free education at a great institution along with the opportunity to play football in the best conference in the nation. To me, that's priceless." Landing Crowell would also be priceless

Landing Crowell would also be priceless for the Bulldogs. He ran for 1,721 yards and 18 touchdowns on 147 carries last season and led Carver-Columbus to the Class AA semifinals. In a quarterfinal win over Thomasville, Crowell erupted for 305 yards and five touchdowns on just 20 rushes.

Crowell has said from the beginning that he will wait until National Signing Day to make his decision. Added McGee: "Isaiah will do what is the best for Isaiah."

Drew is reportedly considering Auburn, Clemson, Georgia, LSU and Miami (Fla). "It's going to be very interesting," said Scott Janovitz, who hosts "The Official Visit" on 790 the Zone. Janovitz spoke with Drew on Monday and is reporting that the Bulldogs are recruiting the five-star prospect as an outside linebacker instead of a defensive end. Janovitz called Georgia's pitch "a tremendous blunder," because "Drew wants to play with his hand in the dirt." In other words, Drew prefers to stay at defensive end and that could spell doom for UGA's hopes.

One of Crowell's teammates also remains up for grabs. Georgia is in the mix for Carver-Columbus defensive tackle Gabriel Wright, but Auburn reportedly has the lead ahead of Tennessee.

Chattahoochee scored a series of thrilling playoff wins en route to the Class 4A state championship, and there has already been plenty of offseason drama for a number of Cougars. Wide receiver Kane Whitehurst has not been anywhere on Arkansas' radar screen, but that all changed when Bobby Petrino came to take a look not at Whitehurst, but at teammate Barron Dixon. While Dixon is headed to Mississippi State, it is Whitehurst who is now set to become a Razorback. Quarterback Timmy Byerly is also garnering late interest from BCS schools. Michigan and Mississippi State have joined the sweepstakes for Byerly, who has offers from Middle Tennessee State and Furman.

TECH MISSING OUT ...

Janovitz is most interested in three storylines heading into Wednesday: UGA's proficiency with in-state recruiting, Tech's failure to sign local players, and the success of SEC schools such as Alabama, Kentucky, South Carolina, Tennessee and Vanderbilt in diving into the talent-rich pool of Georgia prospects. Richt has received almost 20 verbal commitments from Georgia products, including Valdosta High School teammates Jay Rome and Malcolm Mitchell. Damian Swann, a doit-all athlete for Grady who stars at cornerback, is also bound for Athens.

Only 11 in-state prospects have given verbal commitments to Georgia Tech. Head coach Paul Johnson, known for needing very specific types of players for his triple-option offense, has once again placed a significant focus on North Carolina and Alabama. While he is expected to sign Wayne County's Tre Jackson and Chris Milton of Charlton County, his top two recruits (Vad Lee and Airyn Willis) hail from North Carolina.

"They have really not done a good job recruiting what is the fourth-best state in the country for football talent," Janovitz said of the Yellow Jackets. "They have either missed on guys they should have offered or they offered and did not recruit hard enough."

At South Carolina, Steve Spurrier already has the same number of Georgia players—11—verbally committed to take their talents to Columbia. Among Spurrier's coups are Stephenson safety Kadetrix Marcus, South Gwinnett linebacker Edward Muldrow, McEachern tight

The Wildcats are looking forward to signing M.L. King wideout Demarco Robinson, Grady running back Marcus Caffey and Whitewater running back Josh Clemons on Wednesday.

NOTHING IS FINAL ...

While only a few marquee names remain technically "undecided," the truth is that nobody's college destination is set in stone. Rogers waffled last season, and Janovitz says every school should expect at least one or two commits to back out at the last moment. Tennessee benefited with Rogers, but the Vols should be prepared for a taste of their own medicine in 2011. Johnson committed at the beginning of last season, but recent visits to rival SEC schools have put his situation in doubt.

So you think you know where everyone is going? Well, think again. Fasten your seatbelts, because the quest for the 2011 BCS National Championship—and beyond—is about to begin! *Dimon can be reached at rdimon@scoreatl.com.*



Championship Sunday



The hardwood is heating up.

A rematch of the Class 4A championship game from 2010 will take place on Tuesday as Class 4A No. 1 Miller Grove takes on Mays in the second "Two for Tuesday" webcast on GPB.org. This will be the second time these two schools have met this season. Miller Grove defeated the Raiders 69-52 the first time around, when junior center Tony Parker led the Wolverines with 28 points and 21 rebounds.

Mays looks to get revenge and it could happen with the players they have on their roster. The Raiders are looking to pick up where they left off last season, reaching the state finals with a 22-5 record. But things are not going as smoothly for Mays as they did last year, as they lost three of their first five games this season. But the Raiders seem to be gaining momentum as the season progresses, having won six of their last seven.

The Raiders are led by Colin Cook, who is an excellent shot blocker at 6-foot-6. Cook was named to the All-Region team last season and was even named Region Player of the Year. Other players that will have to play big for the Raiders in order for a victory are Kendall Leslie and Jonathan Williams.

As good of a team as Mays is, Miller Grove is the defending Class 4A state champion and have been playing like a team that wants another championship ring. The Wolverines have played against teams from other states including Florida, New York, Oklahoma, Ohio and North Carolina, and have come out on top every time but once. They even defeated Class 5A No. 1 Milton earlier in the year.

The reason for their continued success is the talent they have each year. Two Wolverines on the Score 44 list are Devon Propst and Henry Brooks. Propst has been a good defender averaging three steals a game and he knows how to find the open man, averaging 3.4 assists per game. Brooks has been a dominant power forward for Miller Grove, averaging 13 points and two blocks per game average this season. Brooks has gotten offers to play college ball from schools such as Georgetown, Rice, Virginia Tech and even Harvard.

Another player Mays has to watch out for is Parker, who could be the best center in Georgia. Parker averages 18.4 points per game and leads DeKalb County in rebounds with 13.4. He is considered by many as the best junior in the state and has gotten offers from Alabama, Connecticut, Duke, North Carolina, Georgia and Georgia Tech.

Miller Grove has also produced some current local college players. Mfon Udofia is a key contributor at Georgia Tech and Donte Williams is a doing big things as a freshman at Georgia.

All the action will start at 5:30 p.m. with the girls playing first. The boys will start shortly after at approximately 7 p.m. The games will be played on Mays' home court, the Coretta Scott King Leadership Academy in the city of Atlanta.



Next up for the men's hoopsters is a trip to No. 16 Kentucky on Saturday. Georgia de-feated the Wildcats 77-70 earlier this month.






