

Breaking down the five classifications

Winter seasons are wrapping up and titles are ready to be won throughout the state of Georgia as high school action heats up in February. On the mats, the 2012 GHSA Traditional Wrestling State Championship takes place Thursday through Saturday at the Gwinnett Center. After grappling their way through intense area and sectional qualification, wrestlers across all five classifications are now seeking glory for their respective schools.

CLASS A ...

Bremen has won three consecutive traditional state titles, but the team will be hardpressed to hold off a host of other contenders in 2012. The Blue Devils lost to Gordon Lee in the semifinals of last month's dual championships in Macon. Gordon Lee then fell to Holy Innocents' 31-29 in the controversial final round. Commerce, which finished fourth at the duals behind Bremen, is also expected to contend along with Social Circle.

The Blue Devils, however, remain loaded in their quest to make it four in a row. Zach Young (120 pounds), Ryne Eriquezzo (138) and Joe Bexley (285) all have realistic shots at the title in their respective weight classes. Looking for redemption after their sour second-place finish in Macon, the Trojans will be led by Jonny Ragsdale (106), Alex Spires (126) and Ethan West (160).

Holy Innocents' looks to build on its dual triumph behind team leaders Brendan Quigley (126), Wes Fanning (132), Jason Grimes (170) and Lee Davis (182).

CLASS AA ...

Georgia's most dominant wrestling dynasty is without a doubt Jefferson. The Dragons have won 11 consecutive traditional state titles dating back to 2001, the first eight in Class A and the last three in Class AA. They sent a message loud and clear that No. 12 is on the way when they simply overwhelmed opponents at duals. All five of Jefferson's matches en route to the championship were decided by at least 46 points. Leading the way for Jefferson will be defending champions Cain Finch (152) and Forrest Przbysz (170) along with Isaac Kelly (132) and Jace McColskey (182).

Lovett and Greater Atlanta Christian hope to make things interesting, if not for first place, then at least for the No. 2 spot. The Lions, who finished runners-up in Macon, are paced by Kyler Allen (106), Cory Erdoes (182) and Patrick Emerson (195). Manning the fort for the Spartans are Zach Feuerbach (160), Carter Clinebell (113), Caleb Bumpers (120) and Parker Fair (220).

CLASS AAA ...

Speaking of dynasties, Gilmer is on the

verge of achieving such a status—if the team has not already. Following the Bobcats' 2011 traditional state championship, they have won two in a row and four of the last seven. A fifth title would match their number of duals triumphs in the same span, as the Bobcats prevailed last month in Macon for duals championship No. 5 in the last eight years. Gilmer will rely in part on Cameron Perry (106), Daniel Bautista (113), Justin Karr (120) and Johnie Flakes (138).

Continuing to make life hard on the Bobcats will be Heritage-Catoosa. The Generals crushed all other contenders at duals before losing to Gilmer by a close 29-27 decision in the final. They have a chance of getting over the hump for a traditional title on the strength of Madison Martin (126), Landon Reed (132), Logan Perkins (145) and Andy Bratton (170). West Laurens, Locust Grove and Carrollton could also be in the mix near the top.

CLASS AAAA ...

Pope is looking dominant and riding a wave of momentum heading into the traditional state tournament. The Greyhounds won their first state duals title last month after finishing either second or third in each of the last four seasons. None of their five opponents came within 20 points in Macon, and they drubbed Woodland-Cartersville 56-10 in the final. In fact, Pope's closest decision was a 44-21 defeat of Ware County in the second round. Now, the Greyhounds are ready to defend their 2011 traditional championship. They appear to have way too much depth for the rest of the field, with a powerhouse roster featuring Cameron Munsey (113), Tyler Haskin (126), Jake Henson (152), Joey Tabaccino (170) and Trevor Stevens (195).

If the rest of the competition is battling

for second place, Rockdale County may be in line for a runner-up finish despite failing to qualify for duals. The Bulldogs boast a trio of individual stars—Alonzo Allen (106), Ulises Ponce (132) and Jose Robledo (145)—that will produce plenty of points. Woodland-Cartersville (second at duals), Whitewater (third) and Loganville (fourth) should also make strong showings.

CLASS AAAAA ...


After some serious drama in Macon, the stage is set for another blockbuster showdown between Collins Hill and Camden County. The two teams squared off in the duals final last month and wrestled to a 27-27 deadlock. Camden County, widely considered the underdog, captured the title on a criteria tiebreaker (two pins to Collins Hill's one).

The Eagles are out for revenge and may be better-suited for the traditional tournament. They feature numerous title contenders, including Sean Russell (106), Ryan Milhof (113), Drew Ferguson (120), Spencer Rickman (132) and Andrew Krawulski (170). The Wildcats are hoping to duplicate their duals performance, and in order to do so, they will rely on production from the heavier weight classes. Gray Jones (182), Michael Johnson (195), Desmond James (220) and Alex Washington (285) are key cogs in the impressive Camden Co. lineup.

Archer (third place at duals), Peachtree Ridge and North Forsyth will be contenders in the competition for third place. Lassiter underwhelmed in Macon with losses to Roswell and Lowndes, but the Trojans are loaded with talent and should put several individuals on the traditional podium.

WRESTLING FACELIFT



Arena preps for state's best wrestlers

The Arena at Gwinnett Center has been home to world class entertainment since its opening in 2003 and will once again play host to the 2012 GHSA State Wrestling Championships from Feb. 16-18. Top acts from across the country, including Coldplay, Red Hot Chili Peppers and Kanye West, and major sporting events, including the 2010 SEC Women's Basketball Tournament and several live World Wrestling Entertainment broadcasts have utilized the arena.

EXPERIENCED HOSTS ...

The arena is currently home to Arena Football's Georgia Force and the East Coast Hockey League's Gwinnett Gladiators. Dur-

ing the 2011-12 NCAA Basketball season, the Georgia Tech men's and women's teams have played home games at the arena. Wrestling isn't the only high school sport to crown state champions at the Gwinnett Arena, as the GHSA Basketball State Championships have also taken place here since 2004. Despite being more intimate than many major arenas across the country, Gwinnett Arena still possesses a knack to reel in some of the nation's biggest entertainers and sporting events.

In order to prepare to host the state's biggest high school wrestling tournament, the arena must undergo a significant facelift so that the entire floor can accommodate several matches going on at the same time. As

noted earlier, the arena is home to the Gwinnett Gladiators, which means that there is a hockey rink underneath the arena floor. The majority of the hockey surroundings must be taken down, as the glass and dashers must be removed in order for the mats and scorers' tables to be installed on the floor. One of the penalty boxes is removed in order to create access to the dressing rooms and training rooms and the other penalty box stays intact for media space.

A large space is required as 12 mats are used on the Friday of the tournament and, as the tournament progresses, the total mats dwindle to 10 on Saturday and there are just five mats lined up in a straight line on the arena floor on Sunday for the final competition. "The arena staff and a number of volunteers roll up the wrestling mats and move them back to a loading area to a tractor trailer provided by Resilite, who contribute the mats," said Gary Philips, Assistant Executive Director of GHSA. Resilite and the GHSA have a corporate partnership so that the mats can come from one organization and don't need to be acquired from the different schools competing.

ICY ISSUE ...

Of course, one of the main challenges that arises in preparation for the wrestling championships is how to cover the permanently installed ice rink in order to avoid any issues with the ice melting or mats freezing. The ice cannot be removed during hockey season to accommodate other events, but the ice can be thinned out so that there isn't a risk of it freezing the wrestling mats. "The staff lets the ice melt slightly and they use the zamboni to suck the ice up," Philips said. By thinning the ice, there is less of a risk of the mats freezing through the insulated board that serves as a buffer between the ice and the mats. When referring to the melting process, Philips said,


"It's done several days ahead of time and by taking the ice up, the transition from the competitive area to the tunnels is smooth and the floor is level." The board seals the ice and keeps it from leaking through and impacting competitions or any other event that takes place in the arena.

The overall space is large enough for the competition, but when taking into account the necessary equipment and the space needed to hold 12 mats for the Friday matches, the space ends up being a perfect fit. Along with the mats, specialized wrestling clocks from the Atlanta Takedown Association are provided and set up around the entire competition area.

Volunteers from across the state and especially in Gwinnett County, collaborate with the staff members of the Atlanta Takedown Association in order to ensure the event runs smoothly throughout the weekend. Since the tournament came to the Gwinnett Arena in 2004, the staff and volunteers have developed a routine that has made adjusting the competition area and rolling up the mats after each day of the event a smooth and quick process. "Everyone knows what has to be done and we can transition from 12 mats down to 10 and down to five without running all over ourselves," Philips said. "And overall, it's a pretty quick process."

The conversion from a hockey arena to a wrestling gym is an involved process that requires plenty of hands to ensure that there are no issues throughout the entire procedure. Without diligent workers carefully involved in every step, the risk of injury to the competitors increases, as does the risk of damage to the equipment. Staff members work meticulously in order to preserve the ice and seal it so that competition is not impacted and the mats are not affected.



Darlington's Jones seeks elusive fourth title

From 1961 until 2011, 23 Georgia high school wrestlers managed to capture individual wrestling championships all four years in which they participated at the GHSA level. McEachern's Brandon Westerman and Toombs County's Bryan Benton were the last two to accomplish the feat, both spanning from 2006-2009. Darlington's Spencer Jones hopes to add his name to that list this weekend in Gwinnett at the 2011-12 GHSA State Traditional Wrestling Championships.

FATHER KNOWS BEST ...

For Jones, it would be the culmination of a wrestling career that began at age five. Jones' father, Scott, got Spencer started in wrestling at an early age by constructing a ring in the backyard. "I won a state tourna-

ment at six-years old and then went to a few national tournaments just to see how I'd do," said Jones of his start in amateur wrestling.

Jones won a few of those national tournaments, and then, it was no looking back. With his father coaching him through middle school, Jones quickly made a name for himself with a strong work ethic and a desire to avoid failure. "I keep (my work ethic) up because I just don't like to lose." He also keeps his head down, he said, as he tries to stay level throughout the process. "I was taught to be humble growing up."

That work ethic helped him win the 2008-09 Class A 130-pound class title. "As a freshman, I had to work hard to get my name out there." After his freshman year, his body started growing so he moved up to the

140-pound class, where he won the 2009-10 title as a sophomore. His body continued to mature, and last year he claimed the 145-pound title as a junior. He finished his junior year with a 34-1 record after going 40-2 as a freshman and a 25-5 campaign as a sophomore. He has moved up in weight again to 152-pounds as a senior, but he is working harder than ever now to finish off his prep career sweep. "If I stop training, I know they won't, so I still work hard."

His routine is a bit different than the typical high school wrestler, though. Jones admitted that the coaches push him harder every day than everyone else in practice because of his decorated past, and he isn't allowed to face his teammates. "In practice, I wrestle the coaches, and they beat me up pretty good." He acknowledges that after facing 40-year-old men, perhaps facing high schoolers is a bit easier during the matches. He also stays in shape during the wrestling offseason by suiting up for the Darlington football team. Last season Jones excelled at defensive back and was named first-team Region 6-A by MaxPreps.

When he does step onto the mat though, he tries to block everything out. He said he will keep a warmup routine the same until he loses and then he switches it up to change his luck. During the match he doesn't think about his streak, he just tries to wrestle and win. "I'm sure there are folks out there that want to be the one who keeps (me) from winning No. 4, but I block all of that out and just focus."

THE FOURTH TITLE ...

Several others have come close in recent years as Cason Thurmond of Jefferson, Woodward Academy's Tommy Carney, Horace Young of Irwin County and Sprayberry's Alex Hudson have all collected multiple titles. Snagging two or three has become common, but it is the fourth that eludes many. Wrestlers such as Collins Hill's Bazell Partridge and Taylor Knapp

and Ethan Blackstock of Alexander were denied four straight because of misses during their freshmen seasons. Pulling off four straight is a chance very few wrestlers get. That would make Jones' feat, should he pull it off, even more impressive because he was able to sustain the success he found early in his prep career.


Colleges have come calling on Jones, including Nebraska and Arizona State, but Jones admitted that he isn't sure he wants to wrestle in college. "It's something I've done since I was five. I may want to rest a bit and see what else is out there." Regardless of his future plans, Jones is a force in high school wrestling, and Gwinnett Arena could be the site of some history this weekend if he etches his name into the record books with a fourth title.

Several wrestlers are attempting to capture a third state title during this weekend's championships. Jefferson's Forrest Przybysz is seeking a title in Class AA after taking the 160-pound title in 2010 and the 171-pound crown in 2011.

Ryne Eriquezzo of Bremen won the Class A 125-pound crown in 2010 and followed it up with the 135-pound Class A title in 2011. Should Eriquezzo win another title an Eriquezzo would have won four straight state titles after Alex Eriquezzo of Bremen won the 140-pound title in 2009. Brothers Braxton and Brandon Owens of Elbert County each won a state title one year ago and both are set to defend those Class AA titles in 2012. Braxton claimed the 119-pound crown while Brandon walked away with the 125-pound title one year ago.

A name you may have heard of recently in college football recruiting news is Dalvin Tomlinson of Henry County. Tomlinson captured the 2010 Class AA 285-pound title and followed it up with the 2011 Class AAA 285-pound crown.





Organization strives to promote amateur wrestling

Parents of high school athletes will probably all agree that it is so easy to find out information on sports such as football, basketball and even baseball. These are "mainstream" sports that children traditionally play at an early age in little leagues and peewee leagues across the country. Newspapers and television stations cover the glamour sports that could feature the next NFL, NBA or MLB player achieving greatness.

But what if your little athlete wants information on a sport that is quickly becoming one of the most popular sports in Georgia? What if you need to know about wrestling? That is where Georgia Amateur Wrestling and teamgeorgiawrestling.com have risen to the top to expand the sport of wrestling across the Peach State.

Team Georgia is prominent in promoting wrestling throughout the state. In fact, the organization is the presenting sponsor of WSB's coverage of this weekend's wrestling state championships.

SUPPORTING THE SPORT ...

Georgia Amateur Wrestling and Team Georgia do more though than just teach wrestling techniques and build the brand that is amateur wrestling in the state of Georgia. Team Georgia is a non-profit organization that supports wrestling in the entire community. According to its chairman, Anthony Flatt, the Georgia Amateur Wrestling Association is the grassroots governing body for USA Wrestling

in the state, the national organization that helps to sponsor the U.S. National team and the Olympic team.

'Our purpose is to grow wrestling and impact wrestlers," said Flatt. The organization hosts over 120 youth tournaments each year, mostly at the middle school and elementary school levels; however, high school-age tournaments are offered outside of the GHSA season. "There are plenty of options in the spring and summer," said Flatt of events for the high school-aged wrestlers.

The organization's website answers questions, serves as a hub for registration for various events and even organizes trips to national events to help showcase Georgia's young wrestlers. If you wonder how to read brackets, check the organization's site. Want to know how to fill out registration forms? Team Georgia Wrestling can help. Want to know all about weight classes, age groups and about times? Teamgeorgiawrestling. com can help with all of those inquiries. "We want to be a portal for everyone," said Flatt of the site. Georgia Amateur Wrestling offers bronze-level coaching certification, as well as education for coaches, athletes and parents.

Flatt has served at the position for three years after serving as Kids Director for three years. Under his watch, the Georgia Amateur Wrestling Association has experienced radical growth to the tune of 10 percent over the last seven years. "We have over 170 clubs (in Team Georgia) through high schools, churches and youth programs. In fact, 75 percent of the wrestlers that compete in the GHSA championships have gone through programs in the Georgia Amateur Wrestling Association."

Flatt was recently named USA Wrestling State Chairperson of the year, an award that honors the recipient for service and leadership within the organization. As an administrator, he hopes to help grow Team Georgia and the Georgia Amateur Wrestling Association even more and to impact wrestling at the next level.

"Last year, \$50,000 went into college programs in the state of Georgia," said Flatt. He noted that Shorter University received \$10,000 to revitalize the wrestling program and five Georgia colleges (three NAIA, one junior college, one four-year university) currently offer wrestling. "We want to keep the college wrestlers in-state. Ten years ago, a wrestler would have to go out of state if he wanted to keep wrestling," said Flatt. He noted that offering wrestling makes sense for some of the state's NAIA schools as it will help with their enrollment and would bring money to the university.

STEPPING IT UP ...

Flatt is also trying to take the Georgia Amateur Wrestling Association to places it has never been at a younger level. Team Georgia has started the Beat The Streets Georgia campaign, teaming up with local Boys & Girls clubs to start programs with atrisk middle schools to give students an afterschool activity. "We wanted to offer students an alternative to going home and sitting by themselves for a few hours where they might get into trouble," explained Flatt.

The first school to participate in the Beat The Streets Georgia campaign was Radloff Middle School, where after-school tutoring is offered along with a two-hour wrestling practice. The middle school would feed into Meadowcreek High School, a wrestling program that turned some heads this year.


Because the Georgia Amateur Wrestling Association is non-profit, every single dollar made is put right back into various tournaments and other projects aimed at expanding the sport. One such project is the purchase and donation of wrestling clocks to various schools to use during events. Flatt said Team Georgia tries to help in any and every way it can.

The Georgia Amateur Wrestling Association and Team Georgia offer a full suite of services as the organization hopes to teach lessons such as determination, persistence and goalsetting instead of merely striving for national championships. Flatt focuses on wrestling, but for the parents that are after titles, Team Georgia does offer plenty of tournaments to satisfy the championship thirst. Young wrestlers can learn for up to two years in folkstyle wrestling tournaments. On a state level, the Georgia Amateur Wrestling Association offers the Kid State Championships, with a "Little Kids" and a "Big Kids" bracket. Team Georgia participates in the Schoolboy Nationals (middle school level) in Indianapolis, the Cadet Nationals (high school freshman/sophomore) in Daytona Beach, as well as the Junior Nationals (high school juniors and seniors) in Fargo, N.D. The Junior Nationals is a 10-day event that has 50-60 of Georgia's best wrestling in front of the largest collection of college recruiters in the country each summer.

If you are a wrestler, parent or coach, the Georgia Amateur Wrestling Association and teamgeorgiawrestling.com are both wanting to help. Team Georgia's main mission is to help nurture the sport so that it might grow to be as popular and successful as baseball, football and basketball. 



Wrestling program not pinned by tornado

On April 27, 2011, an EF-4 tornado struck the town of Ringgold, Ga. The tornado tore through the town, leaving leveled buildings and piles of debris in its wake.

One of the hardest areas hit by the twister was Ringgold High School. While the school suffered damage and was closed for several months, the athletic facilities were even more heavily damaged according to Ringgold High School athletics director Robert Akins. He called the event something that "traumatized all of us and affected everything."

THE DAMAGE ...

Among the damaged athletic facilities was the fieldhouse used by both the wrestling and cheerleading teams. When the administration visited the campus the day after the storm, they found the roof missing and the sides of the building blown in. Without the roof, the heavy rain was able to penetrate the building and destroy everything inside the fieldhouse. Due to the building being unstable, no one was allowed to enter the fieldhouse. Days later when the building was determined to be stable, insurance adjusters told the Ringgold faculty that everything in the building was contaminated. Everything from mats to wrestling shoes to old trophies were too damaged to be recovered.

Without an adequate place to train in

the offseason, the Tigers' wrestling team was forced to explore different avenues to complete its workouts this past summer. The team's options were limited, but the team ended up holding their practices at neighboring Tiger Creek Elementary. While they were able to practice at the school, the Tigers weren't able to conduct their normal routine. They practiced on the mats for 30 minutes and spent the remainder of the time running the track or doing other auxiliary workouts.

One of the mats the wrestling team practiced on during the summer was donated by Heritage High School. This was one of many gracious acts nearby Heritage High School showed its neighbors. Heritage also allowed the Tigers to use its campus to conduct classes during May of 2011.

While head wrestling coach David Moss and his team were practicing elsewhere, Ringgold principal Sharon Vaughn and assistant superintendent Damon Raines went to work on repairing the school's facilities. The school had to cover some of the costs but received monetary relief from FEMA, their insurance company and the community. The Ringgold community came together to help the school and produced \$300,000 of donated aid.

"The community is a big reason we are in the position to be rebuilding our facilities" said Akins. "Ringgold played a huge role in rebuilding our school."

Some of the money donated from the community came from Georgia wrestling clubs. Bud Hennebaul and the Atlanta Takedown Association was one of the many wrestling associations to come to the aid of the Ringgold wrestling program. "It's like a huge brotherhood, the wrestling community is," said Moss when asked about the donations received by the community. Other programs that donated funds to the Ringgold program were the Creekview Takedown Club and the Metro Atlanta Wrestling Officials.

"Things will not be back to normal until the summer," said the Ringgold athletics director. However, the wrestling fieldhouse has been reconstructed and is being used by the team. The facility has been refurnished with new mats, lockers, desks, weightlifting equipment and other equipment required by the Tigers.

NEW DIGS ...

The previous fieldhouse was only 10-years-old, but the new structure is a vast improvement on its predecessor. Akins called the new facility, "better than it has ever been before, I could not ask for anything better on the high school level." Moss was also very impressed with the new wrestling fieldhouse. "I want to thank everyone who contributed and prayed for us, it really means a lot." A member of one of the wrestling clubs that donated to the school, Gary Schaefer believes that the new facility is "better than anything the school has ever had, equipment wise."

Even the new wrestling facility can't replace the Ringgold wrestling program's biggest loss from last year, Adam "Tex" Carroll. Adam would have been a senior on this year's team, but was found dead with other family members in his grandmother's home nearby in Tennessee after the tronado.

"I remember Adam as a young man who always had a smile on his face, who loved Ringgold High School with all his heart, and was loved by the students of Ringgold High School," said Moss. "The younger wrestlers did not know Adam well, but the upperclassmen knew him well and they miss him."


Gary Schaefer of the Atlanta Takedown Association believes that Ringgold "has always been one of the better teams in the state when it comes to wrestling," and the school's seven state titles are an example of that. Even though this is obviously a difficult year for the program, Moss' goal is still to bring a state championship to Ringgold High School. The Tigers were 7-3 in the month of January and 20-8 overall this year. Though the team is not at the top of its region, Moss knows his team is not far from being superb again.

"(Ringgold's team) is young and resilient, and they expect to do well," said Moss. "The guys have fought real hard this season."

"This brought us closer as a team; going through this really has brought us all together," said Akins about the Ringgold tragedy. Moss echoed the athletic director's statement and believes that it has helped his team push through the season.

This weekend, three Tigers wrestlers will compete for the state championship. Sam Shepard (120), Jake Quarles (195) and Chase Orr (285) carry the banner for Ringgold, and the people of Georgia recognize that these wrestlers represent more than just themselves and their team.
