Does Atlanta have a Jeremy Lin?

Jeremy Lin and all of the Linsanity that surrounds the New York Knicks point guard will be coming to Atlanta towards the end of March. The Hawks faced off against Lin and the Knicks this past Wednesday, though the outcome was not available at press deadline.

News surrounding Lin has been Lin-ough to give anyone a headache but, of course, Atlanta has gone all in, as the city is one of the most NBA-frenzied cities in the country according to television numbers. The guys from 790 The Zone's "Mayhem in the AM" had several guests on to discuss the new Linsation, including ESPN personality Jay Williams, Knicks play-by-play man Mike Breen and author Buzz Bissinger. Breen also calls games for ESPN/ABC and is perhaps the best announcer currently going for NBA basketball and he offered a glowing assessment of Lin, though he also said he wanted to see it continue over time, not just in the small sample size of games we currently have for Lin.

As an outsider looking at the Lin situation, you have to be intrigued by Lin and wonder how several other teams cut Lin during just this season. You also have to wonder if perhaps Atlanta has ever had a Jeremy Lintype of player. Have any of the Atlanta teams ever had a guy seemingly come out of nowhere and, against serious odds, excel so quickly? Some people would point at Jeff Teague in last year's playoffs, but you could not include Teague in the conversation as he was outstanding at Wake Forest and the Hawks took him in the first round. Ivan Johnson is having a nice season; he may be the closest thing the Hawks have had this year to Lin.

O'DOMINANT ...

The Braves could throw Eric O'Flaherty at you, but outside of baseball people, hardly anyone could really tell you just how dominating EO was last year for the Braves. Jason Heyward and Jeff Francoeur had the type of Linsanity impact in their first few games, much like Lin did, but both came with huge expectations, the opposite of Lin.

The closest thing the city of Atlanta has would be Falcons cornerback Brent Grimes. The current free agent 5-foot-10 corner was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2006 out of Shippensburg University but was allocated to NFL Europe in 2007. He was signed to the practice squad following training camp. He was waived once during the year before being resigned to the practice squad and finally activated late in the year. Grimes would start six games in 2008 before excelling in 2009 and making the Pro Bowl in 2010.

In 2011 Grimes was the best corner on the squad, earning the nickname Optimus Grimes after "shutting down" Calvin "Megatron" Johnson earlier in the year. Like Lin, Grimes "came out of nowhere," but unlike Lin, it took Grimes a while before he received league recognition with a trip to the Pro Bowl. Atlanta is still searching for a Lin but in the meantime, Hawks fans can go watch Lin later in March, assuming the Knicks guard is still in the lineup.

I picked up a copy of Sports Illustrated a few weeks back and read a story about the Winnipeg Jets and how much the city of Winnipeg LOVES having hockey back in town. 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Hope springs eternal for Braves, not Jackets By Ricky Dimon

It's time to start thinking about Atlanta Braves baseball, and not just because there has been very little to cheer when it comes to college and professional sports in this state in 2012. Pitchers and catchers reported to spring training last Sunday and position players reported on Friday.

After last season's epic collapse, the Braves and their fans obviously can't wait to get out there and erase the demons of 2011. Experts, however, are telling us—again—to "wait 'til next year." And why not? Atlanta did next to nothing in the offseason while the Marlins and Nationals went out and spent heaps of cash. The Phillies aren't getting any younger and they will be without Ryan Howard for a while, but they are still the Phillies.

That being said, the Braves did not have to make radical changes and thus the front office did not panic. They just have to hope... for Dan Uggla to hit better than .233 this season, for Jason Hayward to hit better than .227, for Martin Prado's 2010 self to return and for Chipper Jones, Tim Hudson, Tommy Hanson and Jair Jurjjens to stay in one piece. Technically, the Braves do not have any newcomers of note (aside from shortstop Tyler Pastornicky), but Hayward and Prado were basically a wash last season and same goes for Uggla's first half and Jurjjens' second half.

A lot has to go right for the Braves to contend this season, and I mean a lot. But spring is rapidly approaching and this is the time of year when we just have to think everything will, in fact, go right. Wait 'til this year!

HOW BAD IS TECH? ...

I can't figure out the Georgia Tech men's basketball team. I mean, obviously the question isn't whether or not the Yellow Jackets are good. Everyone knows they are downright wretched. But I can't decide if they are the worst team in all of Division I or if they are simply the worst team in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

On one hand, Tech has wins at Georgia and at N.C. State. Georgia is bad but not terrible and N.C. State is actually on the NCAA Tournament bubble. The Jackets also beat Virginia Commonwealth (a Final Four team in 2011, 23-6 this year having won 12 of its last 13 games) by 13 points. Some of their losses have been respectable, too: seven points to Duke, two points at Clemson and one point on an overtime buzzer-beater at Virginia Tech.

At the same time, though, Georgia Tech has some inexplicably woeful bullet-points on its resume. Brian Gregory's squad lost to Alabama by 25, got blown out 70-38 at home by Virginia and just got clobbered 56-37 at home by Clemson on Tuesday. The Yellow Jackets are dead last in the ACC at 2-10 (yes, behind even Wake Forest!). Of 344 Division I basketball teams, they are 311th in points per game (61.0) and 314th in assists per game (10.7) as of Wednesday.

Glen Rice Jr.'s indefinite suspension certainly does not help matters, but it isn't the difference between mediocrity and bottomfeeding. Rice may be the top threat for Georgia Tech, but he would be nothing more than a nice role player for any upper-echelon ACC team or any NCAA Tournament team.

Speaking of the ACC, this is not exactly an ideal year for the conference tournament to be held right here in Tech's own Philips Arena home. Oh well.

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PANTHER POWER

Hunter changing GSU hoops culture

One year ago the Georgia State men's basketball team struggled to a 12-19 record and was bounced from the CAA tournament in the second round. After yet another poor season, Rod Barnes was let go as head coach and the Panthers brought in IUPUI coach Ron Hunter.

CH-CH-CHANGES ...

Many wondered how much of a difference Hunter would make in his first year considering the Panthers would have the same core group of players in 2011-12 as they had in 2010-11. The Hunter era got off to an inauspicious start as State dropped its first three games at the World Vision Classic in Seattle, but the Panthers came back from the tough start undeterred and refused to slip into mediocrity, rattling off 11 consecutive victories. This streak included an impressive road win over VCU, a Final Four participant a year ago.

At 19-9 (10-6 CAA), Hunter has the Panthers on the verge of their first 20-win season since 2003-04, when they were members of the Atlantic Sun. Entering his first season at Georgia State, Hunter said his goal was to, "change the culture...[make it] where when people look at the program they think about winning. The expectations are not in wins and losses, but for people to believe the culture has changed."

Hunter is no stranger to success and cul-

tivating a winning culture at a program. He spent 17 years at the helm of IUPUI, which started off as a Division II school and in his tenure became a successful D-I program, including an NCAA Tournament appearance in 2003. Hunter's pedigree of taking a small program to heights previously unimagined fit perfectly into Georgia State's plans.

The Panthers enjoyed success in the Atlantic Sun, including a trip to the second round of the NCAA Tournament in 2000-01. A perennial contender in the Atlantic Sun, they took on the challenge of entering the Colonial Athletic Association in 2005, one of the best mid-major conferences in college basketball as evidenced by two separate Final Four teams in the past five seasons.

CONFERENCE UPGRADE ...

Since entering the CAA, Georgia State has toiled in mediocrity, never producing a winning season until this year. Hunter has brought an incredible amount of energy to the sidelines, which has helped to revitalize the entire program. His energy has not been confined just to the basketball court. He has been relentless in recruiting and has what could be the school's best class ever lined up for 2012, headlined by his son R.J. Hunter.

Hunter's energy is contagious; the team can't help but put forth tremendous effort because its coach wouldn't allow anything less. Hunter never sits down and refuses to stop coaching no matter what the score is. This was exemplified last Saturday against UTSA. The Panthers were up double-digits late in the second half when they allowed an easy Roadrunner layup. Hunter called timeout and lit into his team in the huddle. His frustration was not in allowing a bucket, but the way the Panthers gave it up without resistance.

Hunter's focus is always on improvement and this is part of his commitment to changing the culture of the team. He said that last year it seemed that "the guys were just going through the motions out there," but this year he wanted to instill a passion for the game. "I don't care what you do in life. If you don't have passion, you can't do it well," Hunter said. "One thing we can control is how hard we play and that's one thing I talked about is having passion for they game they love... basketball."

Under Hunter, the Panthers have undergone a major culture change. They have swapped their losing habits for winning ones. They now have the ability to withstand runs by opponents and have the resiliency to come back from deficits. The Panthers have put a huge emphasis on improving defensively, led by senior center Eric Buckner and his dominance in the paint.

Buckner has demolished the school's blocks record both in a single season and for a career, despite only being a Panther since last season. Along with Buckner's presence in the middle, the backcourt rotation for the Panthers has become adept at trapping opponents and taking the ball away, leading to easy baskets in transition. As a whole the team has 266 steals and has accumulated 149 blocked shots, 98 of those by Buckner, and allows 59.3 points per game. Last year, the totals were 201 steals, 148 blocks and 64.1 points per game.

While steals and blocks have gone up, the Panthers have also cut back on fouls. They are averaging 16.2 fouls per game, compared to 21.2 last year, showing the commitment to playing tough, disciplined defense. Hunter attributes the change to players "buying into the system." The Panthers play a matchup zone in which they often full-court press their opponents and trap the ball-handler. Hunter said the defense could be defined as "organized chaos" and that the entire team has bought into his system and they put full effort into playing tenaciously on the defensive end of the floor.

Hunter has come in and done a remarkable job in making this team a contender. The Panthers have shown the ability to compete and beat the best teams in the conference, and they will be a dangerous team in the CAA Tournament. Hunter has succeeded thus far in his goal of changing the culture around the program. Fans flock to the Sports Arena for home games with students and alumni filling the arena like never before. The average attendance for games at the Sports Arena is up to 1,378 per game, compared to just 915 a game last season.

While Hunter has been pleased by the early success, he is not satisfied. "The easiest part is to build a winner, the hard part is to maintain it, and that's what I'll start right after the first day of the offseason is to maintain that winning attitude."

This constant drive to win and to succeed is what has made Hunter a successful coach, and it will be that drive that will continue to elevate the Panthers' basketball program.

Sanders Commings





S queaks, streaks, swishes and slam dunks will be all the rage over the next few weeks as the GHSA basketball playoffs will crown 10 champions. Schools such as GAC, Buford, Norcross and Wesleyan will be out to defend titles from one year ago while perennial powers such as Milton, Wheeler and Southwest DeKalb and newcomers like St. Francis and Morgan County will look to prevent repeats and three-peats. And plenty of eyes will be on Miller Grove to see if Tony Parker and company can pull off four straight.

GIRLS FAVORITES ...

The Wesleyan girls have won three straight Class A titles as well as a Class 2A crown in 2008. Meanwhile, Buford has taken the last three titles since Wesleyan moved down in classification. Andraya Carter is back from injury and would like nothing more than to leave for Tennessee with a fourth state title in her back pocket. Buford junior Kaela Davis won a state title with Norcross in 2010 before picking up another with the Wolves last year. She is trying for her third in a row. Wesleyan, meanwhile, will attempt to win the title without a No. 1 seed, the first time that has happened since the Wolves moved down. The Wolves won the 2008 2A title as a No. 2 seed.

The Washington County Golden Hawks have won 59 straight games entering the playoffs and are looking to capture a second straight Class 3A girls title. Junior point guard Allisha Gray was hot in the region tournament and look for her to explode in the state playoffs.

The Milton Eagles cruised to the 2010 Class 5A boys title and reached the finals last year with perhaps the most impressive collection of talent in Georgia. Norcross had other ideas, however, and rallied in the finals to stun Milton. David Boyd's team has been shaped and primed for another title and seniors Evan Nolte, Charles Mann, Tevin Glass and Shaq Johnson are all on a mission to seize the state title. Nolte was a force two years ago in the championship game, canning jumpers from all over the court. The future Virginia Cavalier could once again play a huge role should the Eagles advance to the finals.

THREE'S COMPANY ...

Greater Atlanta Christian and Columbia will both be searching for a third straight title after each program won in 2010 and again in 2011. Class 2A defending champion GAC lost Malcolm Brogdon from those teams then saw A.J. Davis leave for region rival Buford, but head coach Eddie Martin still has some talent and his team owns the Score No. 1 ranking entering the playoffs. Collin Swinton and Delano Spencer will push the Spartans through the playoffs. Buford, last year's runner-up, appears to be some tough competition yet again, though GAC has beaten Buford three times this season. T.J. Shipes, Kyle Kellam and Davis will be a tough out in the playoffs. Meanwhile Class 3A champ Columbia has a host of talented players including Jarmal Reid, Chris Horton, Damian Goodwin and Jhaustin Thomas down low looking to power the Eagles to yet another title.

Earlier this season the Miller Grove Wolverines were ranked No. 2 nationally by ESPN, but they faltered against some national powerhouses. Regardless, Sharman White's Wolverines are in prime position to challenge for a fourth straight Class 4A title. Seniors Tony Parker, Tony Evans, Justin Colvin, Christian Houston, Davante Provost and Brandon Morris are all looking to go out on top. Meanwhile, Shaq Goodwin and Southwest DeKalb are looking to overcome the monster that is Miller Grove to try and capture a title. Alcovy, Chattahoochee, Fayette County and Jonesboro could also deny the Wolverines a fourth title.

Region tourneys spring upsets, playoff berths

After months of regular season action, the basketball state tournament is upon us and there are some interesting storylines as the tournament progresses the next few weeks. But let's take a look back at some of the action of the region tournaments in the metro Atlanta area and see how some the teams got to where they are now.

WARRIOR DASH ...

After a sub-par 2010-11 season for the North Cobb boys, they bounced back in a big way and finished the regular season and Region 4-5A Tournament with a 24-4 record. This past weekend, the Warriors defeated South Cobb 70-52 in the region championship and the win marked head coach Terry Gorsuch's 200th in his career.

"It's an awesome feeling," Gorsuch told the Marietta Daily Journal after the game. "The kids have worked so hard, playing as a team, playing hard. We worked all year for this and



I couldn't be prouder of the kids for accomplishing this.³

Lee Moore scored 22 points for the Warriors while Dennis Young-Coleman added 10. This was the first region title for Gorsuch, and his team will host Bradwell Institute in the first round of the state tournament.

South Cobb, the region runner-up, is just happy it is playing in the state tournament considering it lost nine of its last 10 regularseason games. The Eagles, who have a 13-14 record and came into the region tournament as a No. 5 seed, will enter the state tournament as No. 2 seed with the loss to the Warriors. The Eagles were able to clinch at least a No. 2 seed when they took down top-seeded Harrison 52-50 in the region semifinals.

"I'm glad our guys are excited about going to the championship of the tournament," South Cobb head coach Gregory Moultrie told the MDJ. "We had high expectations at the beginning of the year, starting out 7-1. We

> had a rough skid, but we got it together. We had a great run when we needed to, in the second half of the season. Eight teams came in (to the tournament) and only two came out with trophies. We wanted to win the region tournament, but region runner-up — we'll take that."

The Eagles will host Jenkins in their first-round contest.

FAVORITE UNDERDOG ...

In the Boys 5A brackets, the usual suspects such as Milton, Westlake, Centennial, Wheeler and Savannah are there. But one usual suspect and defending state champion, Norcross, comes in a somewhat of an underdog.

After losing its last two regular-season games, the Blue Devils were able to bounce back and defeat Meadowcreek in their first region tournament game. But they could not clinch one of the top two seeds because the Blue Devils feel to Mill Creek 61-49.

Norcross will travel to Berkmar this weekend in the first round of the state tournament.

Meanwhile, 2011 5A runner-up Milton cruised through the

Region 6 Tournament and will host Walton this weekend. The Eagles clinched a home playoff game when they dominated Alpharetta 97-64 and did the same thing to Centennial 100-73 in the region championship.

In 4A, Miller Grove looks to be on track to win its fourth consecutive title as they defeated Southwest DeKalb 67-63 in the Region 6 Tournament thanks to a big effort by Christian Houston. The Wolverines will begin defending their title when they face New Manchester this weekend.

Also in 4A, North Clayton won its first region title since 1993 with a 57-50 win over Jonesboro in the Region 4 Championship. Marcus Hunt led the Eagles with 19 points while Dionte Agard added 12. The Eagles will look to carry the momentum in the state tournament starting this weekend when they face Dutchtown.

THE BIG THREE ...

Over on the girls side, there will be three teams to watch for in the 5A bracket. The first team is two-time defending state champion Norcross, which now has a healthy Diamond DeSheilds in the fold. The Blue Devils took on North Gwinnett in the Region 7 championship last weekend and thanks to 24 points scored by DeSheilds, Norcross won 53-38 and has a No. 1 seed going into the tournament.

The second team to watch for is McEachern, last year's state runner-up. This year, the Indians are hungry to get over the hump because they have yet to lose a game. In the Region 4 title game, the Indians cruised past Hillgrove 63-36 to win their second region championship in three years. Pachiyaanna Roberts led McEachern with 22 points while Te'A Cooper added 11. The Indians will host Camden County in the first round of the tournament.

But wait a minute, because there's another team that has an unblemished record and that is the Parkview Panthers. Last year, Parkview had a disappointing end to its season with a 46-36 loss to Milton in the first round of the state tournament. This time around, the Panthers are determined not to let that happen again, and 28 games later, they are one of the favorites to win the entire thing. In the Region 8 title game, the Panthers took care of Brookwood 53-37. Erika Joseph led the Panthers with 15 points

while Marissa Mandelove added 11, six of which came in the final frame.

In 4A, Fayette County may be the favorite to win the title, but Jonesboro is not far behind. After a not-so-great 2010-11 season, the Cardinals turn things around by winning over 20 games for the first time in four years. Last weekend, Jonesboro took on Forest Park in the Region 4 Championship and the Cardinals came away with a 55-45 overtime win. Victoria Florence led the Cardinals with a game-high 21 points, including 14 points in the second quarter. The Cardinals will host Woodland, Henry on Friday night while the Forest Park will host McIntosh in its first-round contest.



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

Top brass heads to Indy for NFL combine

At this week's NFL combine inside Lu-cas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis, Falcons general manager Thomas Dimitroff and head coach Mike Smith will be looking for a dia-mond or two (or three) in the rough.

Last April, Dimitroff traded five draft picks to the Cleveland Browns to move from the 27th spot in the first round to acquire Julio Jones with the sixth overall pick. The Falcons gave up three picks in last year's draft plus this year's first and fourth-round picks. As a result, the Falcons' first selection in April will be late, the 55th overall pick. In the Dimitroff/Smith era, there's been mixed success in the draft, regardless of where the picks are slotted. On the good side, little-known Montana linebacker Kroy Bier-mann was selected in the fifth round of the duo's first draft in 2008. Biermann has proved to be serviceable in the defensive end rotation through the years. On the other hand, defen-sive tackle Peria Jerry is an example of a first-round pick (2009) that has been more often injured than effective. The Falcons have said they want to sign about 10 of their current group of free agents plus find help for the offensive line. Adding another defensive end and possibly a corner-

back are possibilities. Here are three faces the Falcons will take a long look at in Indy. Most likely these players will add depth and not be expected to play at a Pro Bowl level in their rookie campaign. Casey Hayward, a 5-foot-11 cornerback from Vanderbilt, grabbed seven interceptions in for the Commodores in 2011 and 15 total in his career. He also provides a little local fla-vor. (The second team All-American is from Perry, Ga).

Another potential Falcon with local ties is pass-rush specialist Bruce Irvin from West Virginia who actually played wide receiver at Stephenson in Stone Mountain. Current de-fensive end John Abraham is a free agent en-tering his 13th season, and it seems likely the Falcons will only sign him for a maximum of two years, if at all. Irvin is a little on the small side at 6-foot-2 and 245 pounds but has great quickness and is considered to be a tough, highly motivated player. He had eight sacks for the Mountaineers last fall. With tight end Tony Gonzalez likely to re-tire after this season, the Falcons may draft an understudy to spell the future Hall of Famer. 

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
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
