Starters not "Young Guns"; Saints tripping

Lhad to smirk a bit when I read in the latest Sports Illustrated that the Braves' young arms are giving an SI writer 1991 flashbacks. With all due respect to this young wave of prospects, not as much is being asked of them as was being asked of the 1991-era arms. John Smoltz, Tom Glavine and Steve Avery were being counted on to anchor a staff that raced to back-to-back National League pennants.

BAD SAINTS ...

You should never take delight in the misfortunes of others, but Falcons fans certainly must be smiling to themselves a bit with each bit of negative press that comes out from New Orleans. The Saints' first bit of bad news came down when the NFC South team announced it would have to slap the franchise tag on free agent quarterback Drew Brees.

Everyone knows that Brees will be back, but because the team could not work out a contract that would make the system quarterback the highest-paid player in NFL history, the team was forced to waste its exclusive extension tag on Brees. Now wide receiver Marques Colston and guard Carl Nicks could be allowed to walk as free agents, and 790 The Zone's Dave Archer believes that Nicks is one of the best guards in the game today and could be a player the Falcons' target to improve the offensive line. If the Saints lose one of their most important linemen, that would be a big blow. But the blow would be magnified if he were to go to a division rival.

Braves start slow; NFL free agency nears

S pring training started this week for the Braves, but it looks like a little 'spring cleaning' needs to be done before the season gets underway. It may only be the exhibition season, but giving up nine home runs and 18 runs to the Detroit Tigers was embarrassing.

Grapefruit League games are not normally given much attention, but this game was a cause for concern. The starters usually play the first three innings or so and, after three innings, the Tigers led 11-0. Julio Teheran gave up six hits, all homers, in two innings of work. The 21-year old is trying to earn a spot as the Braves' fifth starter after spending last year with Gwinnett. The six home runs were more than he gave up all of last season in over 144 innings. If the Braves are going to rely on Teheran, the young gun has to have a better outing in his next start. The outcome of this game (18-3) was lopsided, but in actuality won't have a bearing on this year and probably won't be remembered when the season starts in about a month. However, Atlanta's fifth starting spot is now highly in question.

NFL FREE AGENCY ...

The most wonderful time of the year is almost here for the football junky. Free agency represents the beginning of a new football year and 2012 will be one of the most interesting offseasons in a long time. The New Orleans Saints' bounty scandal and Peyton Manning's exit from Indianapolis have set the stage for a shift of power that may be unprecedented in league history. Will any defenders want to sign with the Saints after the 'pay for pain' fiasco? Who will sign Manning? Will he be the superstar quarterback that he's always been? In my opinion, the best fit for Peyton will be the Arizona Cardinals. The Cardinals have the best receiver in the league in Larry Fitzgerald and went to a Super Bowl with an aging Kurt Warner four years ago.

The Falcons have already re-signed starting safety Thomas DeCoud, something that was expected given his consistent play throughout his career. Kroy Biermann, of Real Housewives of Atlanta fame, could get big money once he is re-signed as the Falcons' top defensive end. It would seem that defensive end John Abraham's days in Atlanta are over since his wishes of over \$12 million per season are unlikely to be granted. Abraham will be 34 this year and that is the main reason he may not be re-signed. Look for Atlanta to go after a linebacker or lineman in free agency. Two possible Falcons pick-ups could be Detroit Lions linebacker Stephen Tulloch or Baltimore Ravens defensive tackle Corey Redding.

J-SMOOVE

The Hawks got a big win against Oklahoma City last Saturday, and it was mostly because of Josh Smith. Without Joe Johnson, many assumed it was unlikely that Atlanta would beat one of the best teams in the league. Kevin Durant is one of the top-five players in the NBA, but Smith looked like he belonged in that category after scoring a season-high 30 points and leading the Hawks to a win. J-Smoove seemed to be everywhere, hitting threes, dunking in the face of defenders and grabbing 12 rebounds. The game was won down the stretch as Smith scored 13 points in the fourth quarter.

The eight-year veteran has always shown flashes of greatness but has never been consistent. If Smith can play with the confidence he did against the Thunder for the remainder of the season and into the playoffs, the Hawks will be a force to be reckoned with.

Philips hosts cherished hoops tradition

March has arrived, and, with its arrival, comes the madness of the college basketball postseason. Conference tournaments have already begun and Atlanta will once again play host to the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament. Duke is the three-time defending tournament champion, including 2009, the last time the tournament was held in Atlanta.

The time-honored tradition of the ACC Tournament and its place in the college basketball world cannot be understated. With some of the nation's most storied programs, including one of the biggest rivalries in all of sports in Duke vs. North Carolina, the tournament consistently provides historic moments from some of the greatest players of all time, including Michael Jordan, Ralph Sampson and Tim Duncan.

CHANGE IS GOOD ...

Since its inception in 1954, the conference tournament has undergone several location changes as teams have shuffled in and out of the conference over time. The tournament has typically found a home in North Carolina, starting out in Raleigh and, in 1967, rotating between Charlotte and Greensboro. With four teams in the conference – North Carolina, Duke, N.C. State and Wake Forest – based in the state, it only made sense that the tournament be played in their backyards.

In the 1980s, the tournament did make its

way elsewhere outside of North Carolina, to Landover, Md., which had hosted the tournament once before in 1976, and Atlanta, at The Omni. Greensboro remained the host every other year during this time frame.

Despite branching out of North Carolina during the 1980s, the tournament stayed in the area until 2001, with Greensboro and Charlotte both playing host throughout the 1990s. It wasn't until the new millennium when more cities such as Washington D.C. and Tampa were given the chance to hold the tournament.

With many of the conference powers being located in the South, the state of North Carolina in particular, it could be assumed that the tournament's permanent home would remain in the region. However, in 2011, it was announced that current Big East conference powerhouses Syracuse and Pittsburgh would be joining the ACC. This expansion represents more than just adding two programs to an already loaded conference. It represents a shift in the culture and demographics of a conference traditionally based in the Southeastern region of the country. The possibility looms that the conference tournament could find its way to an even bigger stage come postseason time.

As the Big East conference continues its decline, we could see the tournament migrate from its traditional Southern home to the bright lights and historic lore of Madison Square Garden, which is the current home of the Big East tournament. While nothing is currently set in stone for the move, the influx of Syracuse and Pitt does open the door for speculation that the Garden may play host to the ACC Tournament down the road. However, the Big East's deal with Madison Square Garden expires in 2016 so any talk of a migration up North is a bit premature and Greensboro is currently slated to host the 2013, 2014 and 2015 ACC Tournaments.

PRESENT DAY ...

For now, however, all sights are set on the present and Philips Arena in Atlanta for what is expected to once again be a hotly-contested tournament. North Carolina claimed the top seed as the regular season ACC champion by avenging its stunning home loss to Duke by dominating the Blue Devils 88-70 in the final game of the regular season, behind a 19-point, 10-rebound performance from ACC Player of the Year Tyler Zeller in Cameron Indoor Stadium. Despite the loss, Duke enters the tournament as the No. 2 seed. As usual many expect the tournament to come down to the two heavyweights, but there are other teams in the field that cannot be slept on. Florida State is one team that would love to spoil the North Carolina-Duke matchup as the Seminoles beat both teams during the season. FSU humiliated the Tar Heels 90-57 at home on Jan. 14, then ended Duke's 45-game home winning streak on Jan. 21. The Seminoles have to be considered a dark horse to win the tournament and become the first team other than North Carolina or Duke to win the tournament since 2004, when Maryland won.

The hometown Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets enter the tournament as the No. 11 seed, drawing the sixth-seeded Miami Hurricanes as their first-round opponent. Despite an 11-19 overall record and going 4-12 in conference play, the team has played better as of late, despite the absence of leading scorer Glen Rice Jr., who is suspended for the remainder of the season. The Hurricanes defeated the Jackets 64-49 at Philips Arena on Jan. 24.

"We really struggled in a lot of areas during that game," Tech coach Brian Gregory said about the first Miami game. "So we're going to have to play even better than we have been playing over the past few weeks to be successful."

If the Jackets are able to shock Miami, a tough matchup with the aforementioned Seminoles awaits.

Adjusting to a new coach and new system has not been easy for Georgia Tech, but by generating some late-season momentum despite missing its top scorer, the team has the potential to, at the very least, make some noise in the ACC Tournament. Anything can happen in the postseason, and even with a disappointing regular season, the Jackets have shown in the past that they are capable of making a tournament run.

With usual suspects North Carolina and Duke being the clear-cut favorites, darkhorses like Florida State, Virginia and N.C. State will be looking to make their own history by attempting to end Duke's three-year run as tournament champion or knocking out the Tar Heels, who have finished the season on a torrid run, winning 12 of 13 games. The stage is set in Atlanta for a tournament featuring several storylines that could play a key role in crowning a champion. March has indeed arrived and it's once again time to get ready for the most exciting postseason in all of sports.

Opening Day



Some of the elite Georgia high school foot-ball programs have been facing off with various national powers over the last few years, with Colquitt County taking on all comers and Camden County, North Gwinnett and Buford taking part in various invitation-als. This year, many of the teams still com-peting for a state championship steeled them-selves with national schedules that have them in a position to hoist some state hardware.

RUGGED WOLVERINES ... The Miller Grove boys were one of the teams that took on some of the nation's top teams and lived to tell about it. Sharman White's squad faced ESPN's No. 3 team Oak Hill Academy (Va.) and No. 1 squad Simeon (III.) before taking part in the Bass Pro Tournament of Champions in Springfield, Mo. "You have to embrace (the tough sched-ule)," said White. "It will pay off when it comes to tournament time." Miller Grove has several players that

were some of the top recruits in the country, so the Wolverines were an attractive team for national networks, thus opening up opportu-nities for a national showdown. ESPN wanted eyeballs on Tony Parker, one of the nation's top uncommitted recruits, as well as Tony Ev-ans and Georgia-bound Brandon Morris. The Wesleyan girls were another team that sought out competition outside of the state's border. Jan Azar's squad, including Jordan Frazier, Holli Wilkins, Kaelyn Caus-well and Katie Frerking got the better of quite a few teams in the Nike Tournament of Champions in Phoenix. Wesleyan went 2-2 against some of the nation's best, beat-ing Christ The King (N.Y.) and Incarnate Word Academy (Mo.). Wesleyan would later take out Oak Hill Academy (Va.) in a local tournament.

local tournament. The Buford girls also traveled to Phoe-nix for the Nike Tournament of Champi-ons and racked up an important win. Gene Durden's crew edged St. Johns College, an

important win considering the team was without star Andraya Carter. Buford also defeated Germantown Academy (Pa.) in yet another national event. Carter will head to Tennessee next year, where teammate Kaela Davis was scheduled to join her, but now is eveloring her options

Davis was scheduled to join her, but now is exploring her options. Angie Hembree's Norcross Lady Blue Devils participated in a number of events including the Border Battle against Hoover (Ala.), the Crescent Bank Invitational against St. James (S.C.) and Spring Valley (S.C.), the Battle of the Southeast against nation-ally-ranked Riverdale (Tenn.) and The Kay Yow Girls Night Out, where the opponent was Center Point (Ala.). Hembree believes these events help prepare her team for the tough grind of the playoffs and she appears to be right. Her team, including junior star Diamond DeShields is trying to win a third-straight Class AAAAA crown.

SOARING EAGLES ...

One semifinal team with perhaps the most success against a national schedule is the Milton boys. Coach David Boyd took his team to the Beach Ball Classic in Myr-tle Beach, S.C. The Eagles throttled Miami (Fla.), Ballard (Ky.), Bishop Gorman (Nev.)

and Lone Peak (Utah). When Milton, led by Evan Nolte, Shaq Johnson and Tevin Glass, tagged Bishop Gorman, the Gaels were ranked No. 9 in the country. McEachern has an argument as the Lady Indians have gone undefeated this year, blowing away most of the in-state competition just as they have out of state foes. Phyllis Arthur's squad has beaten teams from Tennessee (Riverdale, Overton-Memphis, Memphis-Central) Florida (Hol-lywood Christian) and Alabama (Hoover). The 31-0 McEachern Indians, led by Pachis Roberts, have their sights set on a state title, but nationally-tested Norcross awaits in the semifinal round. The two teams on the other side of the bracket coincidentally are Lexie Brown and North Gwinnett (3-0 vs. national foes) and Hillgrove, which has not faced a team from outside the Georgia border. While these are just a few of the teams remaining that achieved some success, oth-er schools took part in various events that challenged the national elite. Semis feature metro Atlanta flavor

Tt all comes down to this.

▲ There are no more showcases, Tuesday night showdowns or region tournaments. The state championships take place this weekend, and when it's all said and done, 10 teams will have the right to call themselves the best in Georgia.

The Class AAAAA and AAAA championship games will be played at the Arena at Gwinnett Center while AAA, AA and A will have the finals at Macon Coliseum. All the semifinal games have been played on Wednesday, Thursday, and today at the same locations. So this will be a look at the teams that reached from the metro Atlanta area and how they got to the Final Four.

OH, MANN ...

After a disappointing loss in last year's state title game to Norcross, Milton made its way back to the final four and has looked stronger than ever. However, if they do reach and the championship game, they will have to do it without Georgia-signee Charles Mann who was ejected from the quarterfinal win against North Gwinnett and will have to sit out the next two games.

Regardless, the Eagles are still expected to win the title, but they have to watch out for the other three teams that have made the cut (Savannah, Alpharetta and Harrison). Savannah has been in this dance before as the program has reached the semifinals 29 times since 1926. Alpharetta and Harrison played in their first semifinals, but showed they can play with the best of them. The Raiders did lose 12 games during the regular season, but they got hot once they entered the tournament with wins against Lassiter, Peachtree Ridge and Berkmar. The Hoyas found ways to defeat teams like Norcross, South Gwinnett and Dr. Phillips (Fla.). They lost in the semifinals of the Region 4-AAAAA Tournament, but bounced back in the state tournament with wins against Johnson-Savannah, Valdosta and M.L. King.

It's a DeKalb-Clayton affair in AAAA as Miller Grove, Jonesboro, North Clayton and Southwest DeKalb played in the semifinals. Based on recent history, Miller Grove should be the favorite to win its fourth consecutive title. They have the tools to claim the title as they have one of Georgia's best players in Tony Parker. And let's not forget about Brandon Morris, a Georgia signee.

However, Southwest DeKalb has Memphis-bound Shaq Goodwin and Jordan Price who is an Auburn signee, and North Clayton has Marcus Hunt (Georgia Tech). There has been and will be top-notch players all over the court, so it will come down to experience and coaching, and that's where Miller Grove has the edge.

Columbia has reigned supreme in AAA for the last two years and the three other teams that made the semifinals have little or



no history in the tournament. It is Drew's first semifinal, Washington played in its first semifinals since 1987 and Eagles Landing made the semifinals last year, but lost to Columbia. If the Eagles do win the title, it will be their fifth title in seven seasons, which will be the first time since 1936-42 any boys team has accomplished that feat (Lanier).

Whitefield Academy has been one of the top teams in Class A for the last 10 years and have played in its eighth final four in the last 10 seasons. Led by Georgia signee Kenny Gaines, the WolfPack have a chance to win their first state title since 2009.

GIRL POWER ...

In AAAAA, many believe the state title was played on Thursday when defending state champion Norcross took on undefeated McEachern, as most experts believed the winner of that game will go on to win the state title. The reason for that is the other two teams in the final four, North Gwinnett and Hillgrove, have not played in a semifinal game in the last 40 years. One thing to watch for is if the Lady Indians do win against Norcross and take home the state title, they will have a chance to win a mythical national title as they are ranked No. 2 in the country according to ESPN.

The Miller Grove boys are a favorite to win Class AAAA, and the same thing could be said about the girls who made their first final four appearance. Southwest DeKalb is also back in the final four. The Lady Panthers have won state titles in 2008, 2009 and 2010 but they did not qualify for last year's state tournament. Jonesboro is coming off a huge win against last year's state champion Fayette County in the quarterfinals, and Alcovy made its first appearance in the semifinals.

Columbia is back in the AAA final four and the Eagles are looking to win their first state title since 2010. The problem is Washington County is looking to defend its state title and become the first team since Woodward Academy (1995-96) to have back-toback undefeated seasons. Washington County is ranked No. 1 in AAA while Columbia is right behind them at No. 2.

The Buford girls are like the football team was the last four of five years years in terms of winning state titles. The Lady Wolves are looking to win their fourth consecutive state title with the help of Kaela Davis and Andraya Carter, a Tennessee signee. Lovett is in the final four for the first time in school history and looking to score a major upset, assuming they get past Laney in the semifinals and Buford takes down Brooks County.

As dominant as the Buford Lady Wolves have been, the Wesleyan Lady Wolves have been stronger, winning the last three Class A titles and eight GHSA titles in the last 10 seasons. The one team that could stop them from winning a state title for the fifth consecutive year is Southwest Atlanta Christian, the No. 2-ranked team which has lost only three games this season.


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Bright future ahead for Panthers

Grimes receives franchise tag; DeCoud signed

And now, let the fun begin. When general manager Thomas Dimitroff announced the Atlanta Falcons would place a franchise tag designation on cornerback Brent Grimes last week, it was the first of many steps in the process of reshaping the Falcons' 2012 roster, the defense in particular.

OPTIMUS GRIMES ... Grimes developed from an undrafted free agent from Division II Shippensburg into a Pro Bowler in 2010. Listed at 5-foot-10, he grabbed six interceptions in 2009, and five in 2010. Injuries limited Grimes to only 12 games last season, and he intercepted just one pass. A true ball-hawk, Grimes uses his leap-ing ability and freakish body control to over-come bis lack of size

ing ability and freakish body control to over-come his lack of size. The "tagging" of Grimes means the Fal-cons can expect to sign him to a contract in the \$10 million range. Dimitroff has stated public-ly that the plan is to ink Grimes to a long-term contract. Grimes' agent, Ben Dogra, has said that Grimes will not sign the franchise tag. Ul-timately, though, the Falcons can rest assured that Grimes is in the Atlanta defensive back-field for at least one more season.

field for at least one more season. Rejoining Grimes in the secondary will be free safety Thomas DeCoud. The Falcons and DeCoud agreed to what is widely be-

lieved to be a five-year deal with a base of \$17.5 million. With incentives, DeCoud could earn up to \$21 million. A third-round pick in the 2008 draft from California, DeCoud has started every game but one over the last three seasons. In 2011, he intercepted four passes and made 109 tackles (79 solo stops). Now Falcon fans can turn their attention to speculating about the futures of linebacker Curtis Lofton defensive end John Abraham. Lofton is looked to as a leader and has the numbers to back it up.

Lofton is looked to as a leader and has the numbers to back it up. A second-round pick from Oklahoma in 2008, Lofton has started all but one game in his career and is the team's leader tackler. The Falcons are negotiating with Lofton and can expect to pay him more than players like Bal-timore's Ray Lewis and Chicago's Brian Ur-lacher. If the Falcons can't re-sign Lofton by the beginning of free agency March 13, he'll find many teams bidding for his services. Unlike Grimes, DeCoud and Lofton, Abraham is not entering the prime of his ca-reer. The Predator has already played 12 sea-sons in the NFL. 

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
